March 22, 2017

Scio Village Council met in regular session on March 22, 2017 at 6 pm with Mayor Michelle Carpenter presiding and leading the pledge to the Flag.

Members present were Carol Davy, Ron Wright, Andrew Turner, George Tubaugh, Ron Thompson and Earl Whiteman. Others included Village Adm. Jake Tubaugh and Clerk-Treasurer Trish Copeland. Ms. Scott was ill. J.D. Long was the representative from the News-Herald.

Turner moved to approve minutes from the previous meeting— Carol Davy seconded; all present voted yes. Motion carried.

Visitors were Bud Mason from RCAP and Scio's Water/WW Superintendent of Record, Brian Jurosko. Joe Citro came in later.

Mr. Mason started by saying that he has been analyzing Scio's water rates and Scio's cost of doing business at the water treatment plant. Mason stated that he's looked over the last 4 years of records and that Scio needs money for *maintenance*. He explained that **Total Costs** include loans, salaries and even a pump turning on and that **Variable Costs include liabilities & seasonal help**. He divided the actual gallons billed to the number of customers and got 2500 gallons-and Scio should be billing for 3500 gallons. He explained that water meters are a village's cash registers. Mason praised Vil. Adm. Jake Tubaugh for doing a good job cuttings costs as much as he can. Mason also said rates are vehicles for revenue. He questioned the "multi-use" portion of our ordinance and said Scio needs to have costs shared. He explained that Scio has a LOW water billing and that our large users need good meters. He stressed that a meter reading audit is important as well as future capital expenditures. Turner asked how our rates compare. Mason replied that for 2016 -17 the \$27.58 is OK for now for a minimum but that Scio is "giving" water away. Scio is only covering the fixed expenses and Scio is digging itself a hole. "Rates cannot be equal but they can be fair". Mason said Scio needs to collect at least \$25.00 from EVERY water customer. Mr. Mason stressed that council needs to look at billable units and at who, what and how are we billing. If council is editing the present ordinance are they bumping up or lowering rates. Turner replied that it would be 1 meter 1 base rate. Mason says the way to do it is the base rate divided by 4 if there is only one meter is the way to do it. At this point Mr. Citro volunteered comments. Brian Jurosko commented that old meters slow down, so new water meters will definitely help the village. Jurosko also said he feels new meters should be placed at curb, but that is costly.

Whiteman made a motion that a picture of the house and the old meter and signed paperwork will be required when each new meter is installed – Turner seconded and upon roll call all members present voted in the affirmative.

Clerk-Treasurer

Copeland asked if the PNC Certificate of Deposit that matured 2/28/17 in the amount of \$55,507.51 could still be deposited to The Citizens Bank as the interest rate is much lower than originally thought. Discussion was that it should just be put to the General Fund and Copeland objected that it can too easily be spent than if it sits in General Fund in its own line item. Thompson made the motion to deposit the funds to Citizens in a certificate to mature on a monthly basis and George Tubaugh seconded. Again, on voice vote all council members present voted in the affirmative

There will be a flat rate shipping of only \$250.00 for the new water meters and it is approximately 4 to 6 weeks for delivery. Tubaugh said 1, 2 and 4 inch meters will also need ordered.

Water upgrades are continuing.

Lead and Copper water testing will again be conducted in May 2017 for the 20 residential properties that were identified per the EPA requirement.

WWTP

A lead-lag system for the pumps has been recommended by the EPA. This will save wear and tear on the pumps and cost is only \$1800.00 to \$2000.00.

The new valve and motor install is complete.

The slug report has been completed and sent to the Ohio EPA.

RCAP

Projected dates for water and sewer service line GIS mapping have been established, the project completion date is anticipated for February 2018.

EPA

Tubaugh requested that council members read the proposed legislation pertaining to water breaks.

General Information

Load limit permits were received and issued for the Utopia pipeline that will need access to village streets. The Village received \$1500 for these first permits which were issued with an 8 am to 8 pm time usage and will only be valid for 45 days; should the company need our streets longer than that they will again purchase permits.

Grandview St. extension of water line is complete with an extra charge of \$800.00 for removing lead line on village property that needed replaced.

We are still waiting for a cost estimate to pave Sunset Blvd. this spring. The county will only price jobs 30 days ahead of actually doing the job.

OLD BUSINESS

Carol Davy said she had met with Paul Coffland (Gooding's Nursery) about trees for the park. Coffland suggested three new trees to be planted and wired and felt ones that would grow no taller than 25 to 30 feet would be the best way for the village to go.

Ms. Davy also said the park needs cleaned up; someone suggested she talk to John Jackson at the DJFS and Ron Thompson also suggested contacting the school.

Mayor Carpenter asked Jake if he could get a date from Brian Stull about when he might be renovating the baseball field at the park.

Wright said the restroom floors need painted and Ms. Carpenter again mentioned that the restrooms will need a closing schedule again.

Ordinance 17-001 for Building Demolition was read for the first time by title only.

Turner asked if any water committee members had received a final draft of edits and/or changes to the water ordinance.

Citro stated the water meter at 106 W. Main St. does not work. He also asked about cleaning up beside the road outside of Scio. J. Tubaugh told Citro he should contact the Engineer's Office as Scio cannot speak for the County.

None presented.

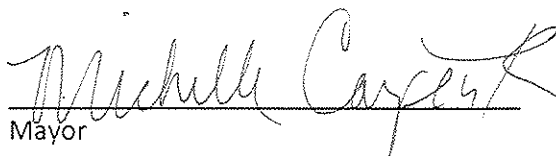
Committees

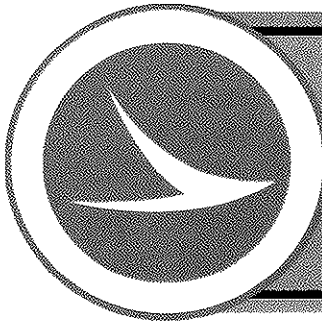

ODOT Kicks Off Construction Season with Groundbreaking Event

ODOT invests \$2.3 billion in roads and bridges

Another near-record construction season is underway across Ohio. This year, ODOT will invest \$2.3 billion into the state's roads and bridges, just shy of the record \$2.4 billion investments made in 2014 and 2015.

This construction season will include 1,098 projects, 26 valued at more than \$10 million — including the Commons Mall Crossing project at St. Clairsville in Belmont County that ceremoniously broke ground as part of ODOT's construction kickoff event on March 30th.

Workers will pave 6,945 miles of roadway — enough for a two-lane road from Seattle to Key West, and repair or replace 1,281 bridges. In eastern Ohio, we will resurface about 175 miles and repair or replace 49 different structures.

"Since Gov. John Kasich took office, we have invested an unprecedented \$14 billion in Ohio's infrastructure," said ODOT Director Jerry Wray. "Our transportation network is Ohio's greatest man-made asset, and it is our duty to ensure it is in the best condition possible. That's why 93 cents of every dollar we're spending on roads and bridges this year will go to preservation."

Safety is always the top priority, and this year's construction program will include 191 projects aimed at making our roadways safer. Statewide, these projects range

from reconfigured intersections to additional signage and signals. In District 11, these safety projects also include slide repairs — when added altogether equals 50 projects worth nearly \$74 million.

"We have seen an increase in the number of traffic deaths in Ohio over the last three years, and we are working hard to reverse this disturbing trend," Wray said.

Overall, District 11 will have more than \$220 million worth of work under construction again this calendar year, including 141 total projects.

In Belmont County, we plan to:

- Finish the \$19.5 million reconstruction of the I-70, U.S. 40, and SR 331 Interchange area to reduce congestion, improve access, safety, and functional deficiencies associated with the existing interchange configuration
- Begin the Commons Mall Crossing project from U.S. 40, including a new bridge over I-70 and a perimeter roadway around the Ohio Valley Mall to Banfield Rd. — all intended to relieve congestion and improve safety at the Mall Rd. intersections as well as increase economic development opportunities in the area
- Complete the \$12 million upgrade of about 4 ½ miles of I-70 around Mall

Rd. as well as the \$11 million Lady Bend Hill bridge replacements on I-70.

In Carroll County, we will perform pavement treatments to over 38 miles of roadways and improve the intersections of SR 43 and SR 183 in Brown Township and SR 9, SR 171 and CR 71 north of Carrollton.

In Columbiana County, we will invest nearly \$19 million and have 25 different projects to resurface roads, replace multiple bridges and culverts, repair landslides, and assist locals.

In Harrison County, we will invest more than \$10 million, including 10 projects to preserve our roadways.

Likewise, more than \$7 million will be invested on pavements, bridges and landslide repairs in Holmes County.

In Jefferson County, we will:

- Complete one of the last two, rockfall and slope stabilization projects under construction along SR 7. Crews are expected to finish the \$16 million excavation, rebuild the

north and southbound lanes, remove the catchment wall and reopen the roadway at Rush Run by mid-summer.

• Additionally, all the dirt work is expected to be completed this fall/winter on the \$30 million project north of Brilliant. All four lanes are expected to be reopened there by June 2018.

• Finish the \$10 million access improvements to the Veterans Memorial Bridge at Steubenville.

And finally in Tuscarawas County, we expect to invest nearly \$17 million on 13 projects, including over 23 miles of pavement projects.

ODOT is also working to make the existing system work more efficiently by leveraging technology like the OHGO app, intelligent transportation systems, and recently-approved variable speed limits and smart mobility corridors.

"The easy movement of people and goods from place to place is part of the ODOT mission statement. Those aren't just words on paper," Wray said.

New ODOT Budget to Transform Transportation

It has been an exciting time to be at ODOT over the past six years. As other states struggle with their highway infrastructure, Ohio has enjoyed record progress with highway construction as a result of its recent reforms, addressing more 6,000 projects over the past six years with an investment of over \$12.5 billion – all without raising taxes.

The capital program for the next two years will also average about \$2 billion each year, which means the Kasich administration will have invested an unprecedented \$16 billion by the time the governor leaves office.

Looking forward, the future looks very different than the past. Transportation management in the 21st century is rapidly changing and ODOT is ready to change with it.

For nearly a century, ODOT's program focus has been to plan, design and build the system. That mission is almost complete. Moving forward, we will take advantage of new technologies and advanced use of data to maintain the system and improve its safety and performance.

As part of Ohio's continuing effort to find innovative ways to reduce congestion and improve safety, the Governor's Fiscal Year 2018-19 Budget is requesting to give ODOT the authority to use variable speed limits to manage the flow of traffic on urban interstates.

Governor Kasich is also proposing to allow ODOT to test a concept called Hard Shoulder Running on Interstate 670 in Columbus—which would complement the variable speed limit test. The pilot would allow ODOT to turn the inside shoulder lane into an extra lane of travel during peak hours.

Both the variable speed limit and hard shoulder running techniques are designed to strengthen Ohio's efforts to keep traffic and commerce moving. If the pilot on I-670 is successful, I anticipate we will see this happening in urban areas all over the state.

Ohio is committed to remaining a leader in transportation innovation and technology. One of the most promising areas for Ohio's economic growth is transportation, a field on the verge of historic, life-changing advances with autonomous and connected vehicles, smart highways, sensor technologies and drones.

Within the coming decade, our nation will see a sharp increase in the use of self-driving and connected vehicles, for both personal and freight transportation. Ohio is well positioned to host these advancements.

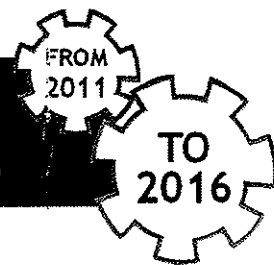
ODOT recently announced a \$15 million investment in a 35-mile stretch of highway between Columbus and the Transportation Research Center (TRC), where new technologies can be safely tested in real-life traffic situations. In addition, the 241-mile Ohio Turnpike is also becoming a premier testing corridor, particularly for the transportation of freight.

Gov. Kasich's new transportation budget includes funding for two additional smart highway projects – one on the Interstate 270 beltway in Columbus and one on Interstate 90 in northeast Ohio.

These smart highways, as well as the Ohio Turnpike, will provide state-of-the-art sites for innovators to test and refine jobs creating technologies.

An expanding network of smart highways will give Ohioans a safer, better driving experience and offer businesses reduced transportation costs, increased operating efficiencies and faster access to markets.

Funding in Gov. Kasich's budget, matched by commitments from private-sector partners, will together invest up to \$45 million for expanded research capabilities at the TRC in East Liberty.

Transportation innovation and cutting-edge research in Ohio are by no means limited to automotive technology. Ohio is also poised to lead drone technology, developing the nation's first "Sense and Avoid" test site. Drone and unmanned aircraft technology is another promising arena where Ohio – "the Birthplace of Aviation" – is embracing the future.

The state recently committed \$1.5 million to a cooperative project with the U.S. Air Force Research Laboratory and Wright State University to develop a ground-based "sense-and-avoid-system" for unmanned aircraft at Springfield-Beckley Municipal Airport in Clark County. This project, with total state and federal investments of \$5 million, will empower drone operators, for the first time anywhere in the nation, to fly unmanned aircraft beyond their line of sight.

The Kasich Administration is committed to embracing this future with new investments and forward-looking policies to ensure that Ohio maintains its leadership position with smart mobility and other emerging technologies – ready to benefit from the business investments and jobs that follow.

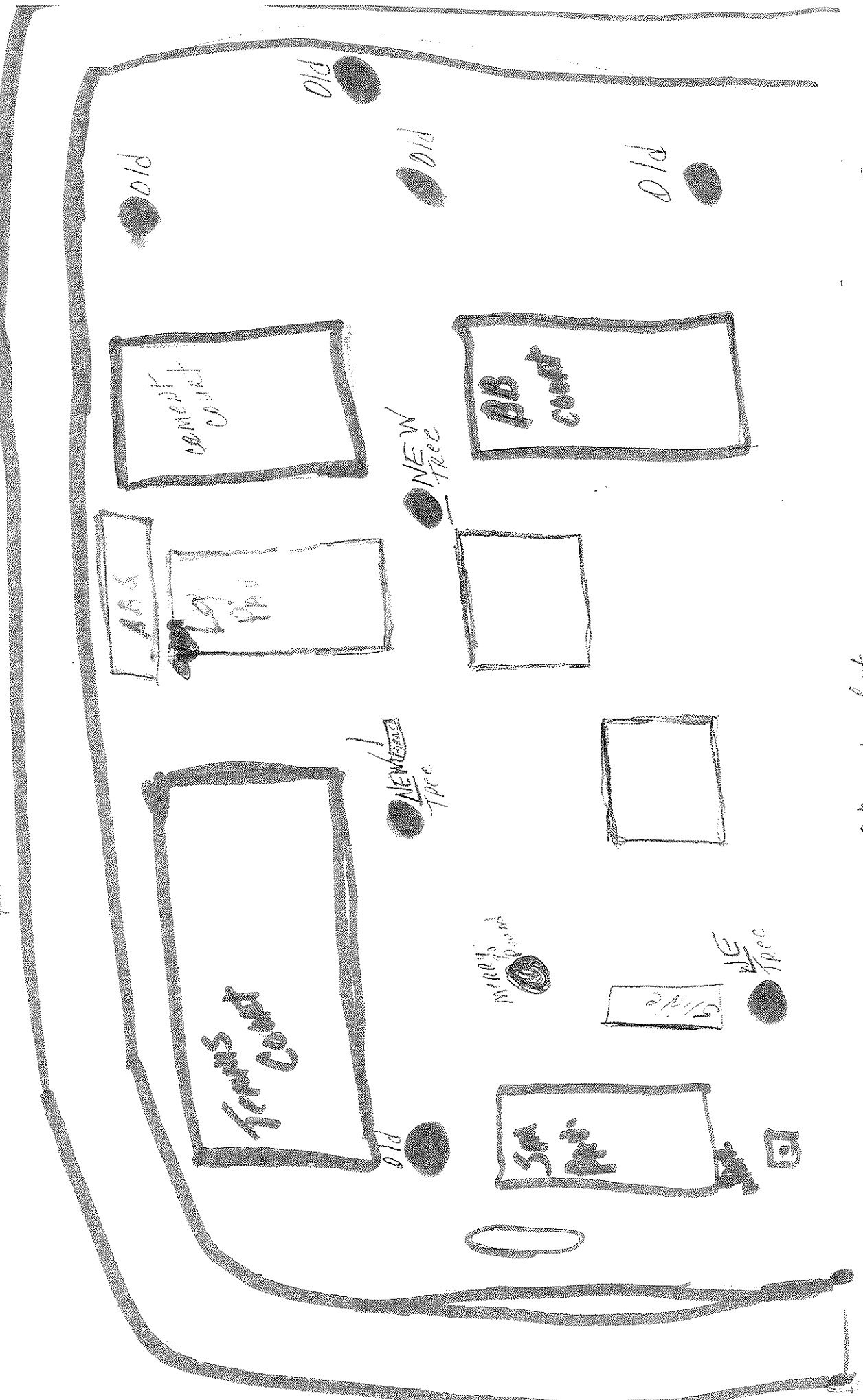
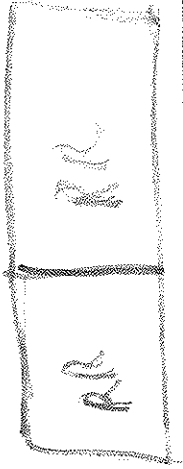
