June 14, 2017

Scio Village Council met in regular session on June 14, 2017 at 6 pm with Mayor Michelle Carpenter presiding and leading the pledge to the Flag.

Members present were Carol Davy, Ron Wright, Andrew Turner, George Tubaugh, Ron Thompson and Earl Whiteman. Others included Village Adm. Jake Tubaugh, and Clerk-Treasurer Trish Copeland. J.D. Long was the representative from the News-Herald. Ms. Scott was out of town.

Turner moved to approve minutes from the previous meeting- Thompson seconded; all present voted yes. Motion carried.

Visitors included Tina Marini and Caitlin Mathews—from the Carroll County General Health District; they are part of a Clean Outside Air Initiative and hope to apply for 2 grants; one for policy of No Smoking in outside public areas and also they will attempt to discourage young people to start smoking. The Mayor explained that Scio has limited law enforcement but the ladies explained the grant would purchase signs for the park. Carpenter than asked what Mathews and Marini need from Scio and they asked if it would be possible for council to sign an ordinance prohibiting retailers from selling smoking products within so many feet of the park. Carpenter said Scio might take the tobacco free area. She thanked the ladies for attending the meeting.

Randy Blumenschein attended the meeting to let council know of the debris that has been deposited into his yard due to the very resurfacing project on Sunset Blvd. The back of his property butts onto Sunset and he claims there is new debris in his yard 15 feet from the edge of the newly surfaced alley. Jake Tubaugh informed him that workers had been to his property about 1 pm on June 14th to clean up what they could-Blumenschein admitted he was not aware that anyone had been there. He said he is concerned about mowing and that maybe he could break someone's window from the mower debris. Jake said they would inspect the area again. Blumenschein said he has pictures to prove his point. Mayor Carpenter thanked him for coming to the meeting.

Clerk-Treasurer

Copeland asked council to approve Resolution 2017-006 that includes all employee pay changes since the beginning of this year. Turner moved to accept the resolution and Ron Wright seconded. Roll call: Davy, yea; Wright, yea; Turner, yea; Tubaugh, yea; Whiteman, yea, Thompson, yea. Motion carried.

It was reported that three summer workers have been assigned to Scio for this summer. Their first day of work will be June 20th. As not all employers require drug testing, the expense for that will be Scio's responsibility, but that will probably be the only costs, as even their work boots will be reimbursed to the village.

Told the group there will be a 2018 Budget Hearing at 5:45 on June 28th.

Mayor

Mayor Carpenter informed council that as of July 1, 2017 there will be more mowing for our employees to do as the Harrison Hills School District has informed the Mayor that the school will no longer be mowing the football field in the park. Also the District will not maintain the concession stand. The Mayor said she told the school representative that the concession stand is to be empty when it changes hands. Ms. Carpenter was also informed that some stands will be left at the field. There was consensus on council that the dugouts, due to safety reasons, need to be torn down.

Mayor, continued

Ron Thompson said that Biddy Football wants to use the concession stand and to use the electricity. Ron Wright moved to let Biddy Football use the stand and that the village would pay the electricity – George Tubaugh seconded. Roll call: Davy, yea; Wright, yea; Turner, yea; Tubaugh, yea; Whiteman, yea, Thompson, yea. Motion carried.

Village Administrator

Tubaugh thanked the 20 residents/businesses that again participated with the EPA's copper and lead testing in late May.

The Water Tank cleaning was rescheduled for late June /July due to weather Smith Engineering was in Scio on June 1st to evaluate the wastewater treatment facility and propose a cost estimate for the repairs needed at the plant. The VA is working with Gorman Rupp for procurement of replacement parts for the lift stations and also a new T-6 pumps for the lift station on Eastport.

RCAP has ongoing GIS mapping of the Village infrastructure, they will continue to assist the Village in the mapping process until completed.

The OEPA conducted a site visit on May 25th, the rep said "the plant looked wonderful". Several raw water samples were taken for OEPA testing.

The Village received plan approval for the WTP upgrades from OEPA engineering, this is a positive step for the Village.

Paving is complete for Sunset Blvd. and lower Grandview St. there is paving pending for a portion of Second St. for the water line and new valve installation.

Phase I for Second St. will start the week of 19 June, the completion date is projected for June 23rd, the paving portion will be done prior to October 2017.

Fenton's Electric will conduct an assessment of the lighting at the Village Park. Turner moved that dusk to dawn LED lights be installed and George Tubaugh seconded. Roll call: Wright, yea; Turner, yea; Davy, yea; Tubaugh, yea; Thompson, yea; Whiteman, yea; motion carried.

General Information briefed to the council by the Administrator:

On June 22nd a meeting is scheduled for requirements of the WTP upgrades and grant process and procedures with AOP and OMEGA.

The mosquito spraying schedule for 2017: **8 June, 12 July, 8 Aug, 12 Sept** These dates are subject to change due to inclement weather events. The One call system is being used to inform the residents.

The Orange property improvement sheets have been posted at various residents the past two weeks – results have been about 50-50.

OLD BUSINESS

Mayor Carpenter said she had taken a picture of Linda Laughlin on June 12th with one of the new trees that had been purchased with Linda's 2016 donation. At that time Ms. Laughlin offered suggestions for improvements that might be made at the park and gave the village another generous donation.

The Mayor thanked Ron Wright for helping with the first round of mosquito spraying on June

Carpenter explained that results might be slow, but our solicitor, Jason Jackson, has been working on finding ways to find those residents that continue to NOT maintain their houses.

A certain College St. resident was discussed as he has been seen tossing his trash over the hill onto the Village's property. Carpenter said she will talk to our deputies about what steps might be taken.

Council asked her to check with Jason Jackson about un-occupied houses.

NEW BUSINESS

Ron Wright said there is a freezer, with lid still attached, sitting on Church St. Jake was asked to use one of the orange clean-up stickers on it.

Turner sked about the weeds around all the fences at the park. Carpenter said she is checking with Job & Family Services for extra help.

The mayor announced a "Work Evening" at the park on June 21* at 4 pm. She then asked for donations from those around the table for flowers or some type of gift for the Roger & Jen Bethel family due to the tragic death of their daughter Ashley.

Ron Thompson moved, seconded by Davy, to approve the Financial Report. Roll call indicated all present voted in the affirmative.

Carol Davy moved to pay the bills as presented and George Ron Wright seconded. Roll call as follows: Wright, yea; Turner, yea; Davy, yea; Tubaugh, yea; Thompson, yea; Whiteman, yea; motion carried.

As there was no further business Thompson moved to adjourn the meeting.

ODOT partners with law enforcement to encourage safe driving

Since 2011, ODOT has been using Distracted Driver Simulators at high schools, fairs and other public events across the state to demonstrate the dangers of cell phone use while driving.

In 2013, Ohio law enforcement agencies reported 62 deaths, 762 serious injuries, and 17,594 crashes that were attributed to distracted driving. Many more crashes go unreported each year, because it can be difficult to prove distraction in a crash.

During the month of April, which was National Distracted Driver Awareness Month, District 11 counties teamed up with local sheriffs and Ohio State Highway patrol posts to educate and encourage safe driving among teens.

OSHP Lt. Joe Fetty from the Wintersville post said, "Driving isn't a game. You have to pay attention, and there are far too many distractions in a car for young drivers. We live in a society where everything revolves around the phone... People are distracted all the time. If you take your vision or concentration off your vehicle for one second, it can become total devastation."

Six of District 11's seven counties either attended events at area malls or toured high schools with the OSHP during the campaign.

Belmont County's efforts

targeted eight schools and reached over 500 teen drivers.

Tuscarawas County attended *The Times-Reporter's* 2017 Kidz Expo at New Towne Mall with the Sheriff's Office as one of nearly 30 other vendors. Around 75 drivers used the simulator.

ODOT staff & the OSHP visited five high schools in Harrison and Jefferson Counties, providing over 200 students an opportunity to see first-hand the dangers of distracted driving.

Jefferson County Transportation Administrator Ty Justice said, "In the simulator, drivers come across a bunch of different scenarios that could happen to them. It gives them the opportunity to see what distracted driving can do."

Fetty said, "We want to reach students at the critical stage when they are just learning to drive a car. They don't need other distractions."

Justice added, "As part of the simulation, if a driver is in a wreck, he or she goes through a simulated court hearing where they learn of fines and how it will impact their insurance

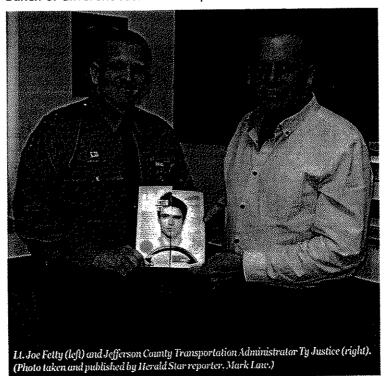

costs. If it is a fatality, the victim's family also makes an impact statement prior to the judge imposing sentence. I think they learn a lot from it."

Carroll County attended a high school event with 111 students, and Columbiana County visited three area high schools during the campaign.

According to the U.S.
Department of Transportation and the National Highway
Traffic Safety Administration,
11% of all drivers under the age of 20 involved in fatal crashes were reported as distracted at the time of the crash. This age group also has the largest proportion of drivers who are distracted.

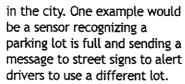


Being SMART About the Future

ODOT leaders from around the state recently met in Columbus to discuss smart cities, smart vehicles, and the future of transportation technology.

Several cities across the world are working to become smart cities, meaning they use technology to communicate data between the city's assets such as schools, transportation systems, power plants, and hospitals. Sensors and real time monitoring systems connect these assets to provide information to people



Columbus is currently working towards becoming a Smart City and other Ohio cities are sure to follow.

Event speakers talked about ways DOTs are collaborating with companies and agencies to have infrastructure in place to operate as smart cities.

They discussed smart cars and the benefits and

challenges moving forward. Having smart cars operating on a roadway could soon be a reality. However, the first step is making sure we have the ability to keep these cars connected with the necessary data to keep them running smoothly. All of this

greatly impacts ODOT. It will change the way we operate, the way we signalize traffic and even the way we design roadways.

ODOT is working to make the changes necessary to accommodate this new technology. We already have certain data and programs in place to utilize the latest technology and be compatible with the upcoming "smart" world.

ODOT also has to be

prepared for the transition period, when only a portion of the vehicles on our roadways are connected and the rest are not. There are some challenges moving forward, but experts say all vehicles will likely have some connectivity within in the next 20 years.

That could range from

cars being connected



enough to know if there is an accident ahead to cars being fully automated with no need for a driver's assistance other than to map out the route.

A Smart World is still hard to imagine, but researchers say we should all buckle up, because it is the future of transportation. There are even prototypes for flying personal vehicles on the horizon.

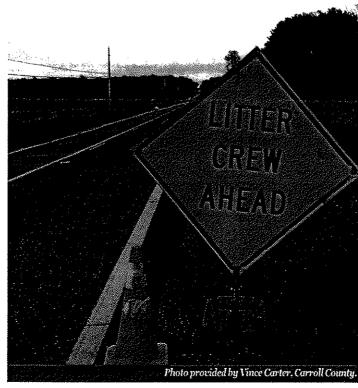

Last year, ODOT, Adopt-A-Highway volunteers and inmates collected over 440,000 bags of trash from Ohio's roadways nearly 18,000 of those bags were collected from state, U.S. and interstate routes across eastern Ohio.

"Litter is a persistent and preventable problem," said District 11 Deputy Director Lloyd MacAdam. "Not only is it expensive to pick up, but it takes us away from more important work, like pothole patching, culvert replacements and guardrail repairs."

Statewide, ODOT spent \$4.4 million last year picking up trash; locally, it cost District 11 \$122,000.

ODOT's 1,400 Adopt-A-Highway groups help by cleaning a two-mile section of highway, or an interchange, a minimum of



four times a year for two years. District 11 has 81 active groups. On average, Adopt-A-Highway volunteers pick up 25,000 bags of trash a year, saving ODOT \$280,000 annually.
